CELL THEORY

TYPES OF CELLS

CELL STRUCTURE

CELL MEMBRANE

NUCLEUS

THE NUCLEUS IS OFTEN REFERRED TO AS THE CONTROL CENTER OF THE CELL. IT CONTAINS THE CELL'S GENETIC MATERIAL (DNA) AND IS RESPONSIBLE FOR REGULATING GENE EXPRESSION AND CELL DIVISION. KEY COMPONENTS OF THE NUCLEUS INCLUDE:

- NUCLEAR ENVELOPE: A DOUBLE MEMBRANE THAT ENCLOSES THE NUCLEUS.
- NUCLEOPLASM: THE GEL-LIKE SUBSTANCE WITHIN THE NUCLEUS.
- NUCLEOLUS: A DENSE REGION WHERE RIBOSOMAL RNA IS SYNTHESIZED.

CELL FUNCTIONS

CELLS PERFORM A WIDE RANGE OF FUNCTIONS THAT ARE VITAL FOR THE SURVIVAL OF ORGANISMS. THESE FUNCTIONS CAN BE CATEGORIZED INTO SEVERAL KEY AREAS:

METABOLISM

METABOLISM ENCOMPASSES ALL CHEMICAL REACTIONS THAT OCCUR WITHIN A CELL, ALLOWING IT TO MAINTAIN LIFE. IT INCLUDES TWO MAIN PROCESSES:

- ANABOLISM: THE SYNTHESIS OF COMPLEX MOLECULES FROM SIMPLER ONES, REQUIRING ENERGY.
- CATABOLISM: THE BREAKDOWN OF COMPLEX MOLECULES INTO SIMPLER ONES, RELEASING ENERGY.

ENERGY PRODUCTION

CELLS REQUIRE ENERGY TO PERFORM VARIOUS FUNCTIONS. IN EUKARYOTIC CELLS, MITOCHONDRIA ARE THE POWERHOUSE, CONVERTING NUTRIENTS INTO ADENOSINE TRIPHOSPHATE (ATP) THROUGH CELLULAR RESPIRATION. THIS ATP SERVES AS THE ENERGY CURRENCY OF THE CELL, FUELING VARIOUS CELLULAR ACTIVITIES.

CELLULAR PROCESSES

CELLS UNDERGO SEVERAL PROCESSES THAT ARE CRITICAL FOR THEIR FUNCTION AND REPRODUCTION. SOME OF THESE INCLUDE:

CELL DIVISION

CELL DIVISION IS ESSENTIAL FOR GROWTH, DEVELOPMENT, AND TISSUE REPAIR. THERE ARE TWO PRIMARY TYPES OF CELL DIVISION:
