OVERVIEW OF MACROMOLECULES

MACROMOLECULES ARE LARGE, COMPLEX MOLECULES THAT ARE ESSENTIAL FOR THE STRUCTURE AND FUNCTION OF LIVING ORGANISMS. THEY ARE TYPICALLY COMPOSED OF SMALLER UNITS CALLED MONOMERS THAT POLYMERIZE TO FORM LARGER STRUCTURES. IN AP BIOLOGY CHAPTER 5, FOUR MAJOR CLASSES OF MACROMOLECULES ARE DISCUSSED: CARBOHYDRATES, LIPIDS, PROTEINS, AND NUCLEIC ACIDS. UNDERSTANDING THESE MACROMOLECULES IS CRITICAL FOR STUDENTS AS THEY FORM THE BASIS OF BIOLOGICAL PROCESSES AND CELLULAR STRUCTURES.

TYPES OF MACROMOLECULES

THE FOUR MAIN TYPES OF MACROMOLECULES CAN BE CATEGORIZED BASED ON THEIR CHEMICAL COMPOSITION AND BIOLOGICAL FUNCTIONS:

- **CARBOHYDRATES:** COMPOSED OF CARBON, HYDROGEN, AND OXYGEN, THESE MOLECULES SERVE AS ENERGY SOURCES AND STRUCTURAL COMPONENTS IN CELLS.
- **LIPIDS:** THESE HYDROPHOBIC MOLECULES INCLUDE FATS, OILS, AND STEROIDS, SERVING PRIMARILY AS ENERGY STORAGE AND STRUCTURAL COMPONENTS OF CELL MEMBRANES.
- **PROTEINS:** MADE UP OF AMINO ACIDS, PROTEINS PERFORM A WIDE RANGE OF FUNCTIONS, INCLUDING CATALYZING BIOCHEMICAL REACTIONS AND PROVIDING STRUCTURAL SUPPORT.
- **NUCLEIC ACIDS:** DNA AND RNA ARE POLYMERS OF NUCLEOTIDES THAT STORE AND TRANSMIT GENETIC INFORMATION.

CARBOHYDRATES

CARBOHYDRATES ARE ONE OF THE MOST ABUNDANT MACROMOLECULES IN NATURE. THEY PLAY VITAL ROLES IN ENERGY STORAGE, AS WELL AS PROVIDING STRUCTURAL SUPPORT IN PLANTS AND SOME ANIMALS.

STRUCTURE OF CARBOHYDRATES

CARBOHYDRATES CAN BE CLASSIFIED INTO THREE MAIN CATEGORIES BASED ON THEIR STRUCTURE:

- **MONOSACCHARIDES:** THESE ARE THE SIMPLEST SUGARS, SUCH AS GLUCOSE AND FRUCTOSE, THAT SERVE AS THE BUILDING BLOCKS FOR MORE COMPLEX CARBOHYDRATES.
- **DISACCHARIDES:** FORMED BY THE CONDENSATION OF TWO MONOSACCHARIDES, EXAMPLES INCLUDE SUCROSE AND LACTOSE.
- **POLYSACCHARIDES:** THESE ARE LONG CHAINS OF MONOSACCHARIDES, INCLUDING STARCH, GLYCOGEN, AND CELLULOSE, WHICH SERVE VARIOUS FUNCTIONS SUCH AS ENERGY STORAGE AND STRUCTURAL INTEGRITY.

FUNCTIONS OF CARBOHYDRATES

CARBOHYDRATES SERVE MULTIPLE FUNCTIONS IN BIOLOGICAL SYSTEMS:

- PROVIDING ENERGY TO CELLS THROUGH GLUCOSE.
- STORING ENERGY IN THE FORM OF STARCH (IN PLANTS) AND GLYCOGEN (IN ANIMALS).
- SUPPORTING STRUCTURAL INTEGRITY IN PLANTS THROUGH CELLULOSE.

LIPIDS

LIPIDS ARE A DIVERSE GROUP OF HYDROPHOBIC MOLECULES THAT PLAY CRUCIAL ROLES IN BIOLOGICAL SYSTEMS. UNLIKE CARBOHYDRATES, LIPIDS DO NOT FORM POLYMERS BUT EXIST AS DISTINCT MOLECULES.

TYPES OF LIPIDS

THERE ARE SEVERAL TYPES OF LIPIDS, EACH WITH UNIQUE STRUCTURES AND FUNCTIONS:

- **TRIGLYCERIDES:** THESE ARE FORMED FROM GLYCEROL AND THREE FATTY ACIDS AND SERVE PRIMARILY AS ENERGY STORAGE MOLECULES.
- **PHOSPHOLIPIDS:** COMPRISING TWO FATTY ACIDS AND A PHOSPHATE GROUP, PHOSPHOLIPIDS ARE ESSENTIAL COMPONENTS OF CELL MEMBRANES.
- **STERIODS:** THESE LIPIDS HAVE A FOUR-RING STRUCTURE AND INCLUDE HORMONES LIKE TESTOSTERONE AND ESTROGEN.

FUNCTIONS OF LIPIDS

LIPIDS PERFORM SEVERAL ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS, INCLUDING:

- **ENERGY STORAGE**, PROVIDING MORE ENERGY PER GRAM THAN CARBOHYDRATES.
- **FORMING CELL MEMBRANES**, WHICH REGULATE THE MOVEMENT OF SUBSTANCES INTO AND OUT OF CELLS.
- **SERVING AS SIGNALING MOLECULES** IN THE FORM OF HORMONES.

PROTEINS

PROTEINS ARE VERSATILE MACROMOLECULES COMPOSED OF AMINO ACIDS, PLAYING CRITICAL ROLES IN VIRTUALLY ALL BIOLOGICAL PROCESSES. THEIR DIVERSE FUNCTIONS STEM FROM THEIR COMPLEX STRUCTURES.

STRUCTURE OF PROTEINS

PROTEINS HAVE FOUR LEVELS OF STRUCTURE:

- **PRIMARY STRUCTURE**: THE SEQUENCE OF AMINO ACIDS IN A POLYPEPTIDE CHAIN.
- **SECONDARY STRUCTURE**: LOCAL FOLDING OF THE POLYPEPTIDE INTO ALPHA HELICES AND BETA SHEETS.
- **TERTIARY STRUCTURE**: THE OVERALL THREE-DIMENSIONAL SHAPE OF A POLYPEPTIDE.
- **QUATERNARY STRUCTURE**: THE ARRANGEMENT OF MULTIPLE POLYPEPTIDE SUBUNITS IN A PROTEIN.

FUNCTIONS OF PROTEINS

PROTEINS PERFORM A WIDE ARRAY OF FUNCTIONS, INCLUDING:

- **CATALYZING BIOCHEMICAL REACTIONS** AS ENZYMES.
- **PROVIDING STRUCTURAL SUPPORT** IN CELLS AND TISSUES.
- **TRANSPORTING MOLECULES** ACROSS CELL MEMBRANES.

NUCLEIC ACIDS

NUCLEIC ACIDS, INCLUDING DNA AND RNA, ARE ESSENTIAL FOR THE STORAGE AND TRANSMISSION OF GENETIC INFORMATION. THEY ARE POLYMERS MADE UP OF NUCLEOTIDE MONOMERS.

STRUCTURE OF NUCLEIC ACIDS

NUCLEIC ACIDS ARE COMPOSED OF THREE COMPONENTS:

- A NITROGENOUS BASE (ADENINE, THYMINE, CYTOSINE, GUANINE IN DNA; URACIL REPLACES THYMINE IN RNA).
- A FIVE-CARBON SUGAR (DEOXYRIBOSE IN DNA AND RIBOSE IN RNA).
- A PHOSPHATE GROUP THAT LINKS NUCLEOTIDES TOGETHER THROUGH PHOSPHODIESTER BONDS.

FUNCTIONS OF NUCLEIC ACIDS

NUCLEIC ACIDS HAVE CRUCIAL ROLES IN BIOLOGICAL SYSTEMS:

- STORING AND TRANSMITTING GENETIC INFORMATION THROUGH DNA.
- PLAYING A KEY ROLE IN PROTEIN SYNTHESIS THROUGH mRNA, tRNA, AND rRNA.
- REGULATING GENE EXPRESSION AND CELLULAR FUNCTIONS.

BIOLOGICAL IMPORTANCE OF MACROMOLECULES

THE MACROMOLECULES DISCUSSED IN AP BIOLOGY CHAPTER 5 ARE FUNDAMENTAL TO THE STRUCTURE AND FUNCTION OF LIVING ORGANISMS. THEY ARE INVOLVED IN VARIOUS BIOLOGICAL PROCESSES THAT SUSTAIN LIFE.

Q: WHY IS CELLULOSE IMPORTANT IN PLANT BIOLOGY?

A: CELLULOSE IS A POLYSACCHARIDE THAT PROVIDES STRUCTURAL SUPPORT TO PLANT CELL WALLS, ALLOWING PLANTS TO MAINTAIN THEIR SHAPE AND RESIST EXTERNAL STRESS.
