- **PELVIC BONES IN WHALES:** THESE BONES ARE REMNANTS OF HIND LIMBS FROM ANCESTRAL TERRESTRIAL ANIMALS AND SERVE NO CURRENT FUNCTION FOR LOCOMOTION.

THESE STRUCTURES PROVIDE INSIGHT INTO THE EVOLUTIONARY PATHWAYS THAT HAVE LED TO PRESENT-DAY SPECIES, ILLUSTRATING HOW INFERIOR BIOLOGY CAN INFORM OUR UNDERSTANDING OF FUNCTIONAL ADAPTATIONS.
