TYPES OF SOLUTIONS

1. AQUEOUS SOLUTIONS

3. COLLOIDAL SOLUTIONS

COLLOIDAL SOLUTIONS, OR COLLOIDS, CONSIST OF MICROSCOPIC PARTICLES DISPERSED THROUGHOUT ANOTHER SUBSTANCE.

THESE PARTICLES DO NOT SETTLE OUT OVER TIME, WHICH DIFFERENTIATES THEM FROM SUSPENSIONS. EXAMPLES INCLUDE MILK AND FOG. COLLOIDAL SOLUTIONS EXHIBIT UNIQUE PROPERTIES, SUCH AS THE TYNDALL EFFECT, WHICH CAN BE RELEVANT IN PRACTICE PROBLEMS INVOLVING LIGHT SCATTERING.

CONCENTRATION CALCULATIONS

CONCENTRATION IS A CRITICAL CONCEPT IN CHEMISTRY THAT QUANTIFIES HOW MUCH SOLUTE IS PRESENT IN A GIVEN AMOUNT OF SOLVENT OR SOLUTION. VARIOUS UNITS OF CONCENTRATION ARE USED IN PRACTICE PROBLEMS, AND UNDERSTANDING HOW TO CALCULATE THEM IS FUNDAMENTAL FOR SOLVING CHEMISTRY SOLUTIONS PROBLEMS.

1. MOLARITY (M)

2. MOLALITY (m)

$$m = \text{MOLES OF SOLUTE} / \text{KILOGRAMS OF SOLVENT}$$

MOLALITY IS PARTICULARLY USEFUL IN SITUATIONS WHERE TEMPERATURE CHANGES MAY AFFECT VOLUME, AS IT IS BASED ON MASS RATHER THAN VOLUME.

3. PERCENT CONCENTRATION

CONCENTRATION CAN ALSO BE EXPRESSED AS A PERCENTAGE. THERE ARE DIFFERENT TYPES OF PERCENT CONCENTRATIONS, INCLUDING WEIGHT/WEIGHT (w/w), WEIGHT/VOLUME (w/v), AND VOLUME/VOLUME (v/v). THE FORMULAS FOR THESE ARE:

- $w/w\% = (\text{GRAMS OF SOLUTE} / \text{GRAMS OF SOLUTION}) \times 100$
- $w/v\% = (\text{GRAMS OF SOLUTE} / \text{MILLILITERS OF SOLUTION}) \times 100$
- $v/v\% = (\text{MILLILITERS OF SOLUTE} / \text{MILLILITERS OF SOLUTION}) \times 100$

UNDERSTANDING THESE DIFFERENT CONCENTRATION MEASURES IS VITAL FOR SOLVING VARIOUS CHEMISTRY PROBLEMS RELATED TO SOLUTIONS.

3. CONVERT VOLUME TO LITERS: 500 mL = 0.5 L
4. CALCULATE MOLARITY: $M = 0.0856 \text{ moles} / 0.5 \text{ L} = 0.1712 \text{ M}$

2. DILUTION PROBLEMS

DILUTION PROBLEMS OFTEN REQUIRE USING THE DILUTION EQUATION, WHICH IS:

$$C_1V_1 = C_2V_2$$

FOR INSTANCE, IF 100 mL OF A 2.0 M SOLUTION IS DILUTED TO A FINAL VOLUME OF 500 mL, THE FINAL CONCENTRATION CAN BE CALCULATED AS FOLLOWS:

1. $C_1 = 2.0 \text{ M}$, $V_1 = 100 \text{ mL}$, $V_2 = 500 \text{ mL}$
2. $C_2 = (C_1V_1) / V_2 = (2.0 \text{ M} \times 100 \text{ mL}) / 500 \text{ mL} = 0.4 \text{ M}$
