DEFINITION OF DIALYSIS

EQUILIBRIUM ESTABLISHMENT

OVER TIME, THE SOLUTES WILL CONTINUE TO DIFFUSE UNTIL AN EQUILIBRIUM IS REACHED, WHERE THE CONCENTRATION OF SOLUTES IS EQUAL ON BOTH SIDES OF THE MEMBRANE. THIS EQUILIBRIUM STATE IS CRUCIAL FOR UNDERSTANDING HOW DIALYSIS FUNCTIONS IN VARIOUS APPLICATIONS, WHETHER IN LABORATORY EXPERIMENTS OR CLINICAL SETTINGS.

TYPES OF DIALYSIS
