- **ENERGY LEVELS:** MOLECULAR ORBITALS HAVE SPECIFIC ENERGY LEVELS. GENERALLY, BONDING ORBITALS ARE LOWER IN ENERGY THAN THE ATOMIC ORBITALS THAT COMBINE TO FORM THEM, WHILE ANTIBONDING ORBITALS ARE HIGHER IN ENERGY.
- **ELECTRON FILLING ORDER:** ELECTRONS FILL MOLECULAR ORBITALS STARTING FROM THE LOWEST ENERGY LEVEL,

FOLLOWING THE PAULI EXCLUSION PRINCIPLE AND HUND'S RULE.

THIS THEORETICAL FRAMEWORK ALLOWS CHEMISTS TO PREDICT THE BEHAVIOR OF MOLECULES BASED ON THEIR ELECTRON CONFIGURATIONS, PROVIDING A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF CHEMICAL REACTIVITY AND PROPERTIES.

CONSTRUCTING MO DIAGRAMS

- **ELECTRON CONFIGURATION:** MO THEORY PROVIDES A MORE ACCURATE DESCRIPTION OF THE ELECTRONIC STRUCTURE OF MANY MOLECULES, PARTICULARLY THOSE THAT EXHIBIT RESONANCE OR ARE POLYATOMIC.

UNDERSTANDING THESE DIFFERENCES HELPS CHEMISTS CHOOSE THE APPROPRIATE THEORY FOR ANALYZING DIFFERENT MOLECULAR SYSTEMS AND PREDICTING THEIR PROPERTIES.

EXAMPLES OF MO DIAGRAMS
