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INTRODUCTION TO RATE LAW

MATHEMATICAL REPRESENTATION OF RATE LAW

RATE EQUATION

THE STANDARD FORM OF THE RATE LAW CAN BE EXPRESSED AS:

$$\text{RATE} = k [A]^m [B]^n$$

IN THIS EQUATION:

- **RATE** IS THE SPEED OF THE REACTION (OFTEN MEASURED IN $\text{mol/L}\cdot\text{s}$).
- **k** IS THE RATE CONSTANT, WHICH IS SPECIFIC TO THE REACTION AT A GIVEN TEMPERATURE.

- $[A]$ AND $[B]$ ARE THE MOLAR CONCENTRATIONS OF THE REACTANTS.
- m AND n REPRESENT THE REACTION ORDERS WITH RESPECT TO EACH REACTANT.

ORDER OF REACTION

THE ORDER OF A REACTION IS DETERMINED BY THE EXPONENTS (m AND n) IN THE RATE EQUATION. THESE VALUES INDICATE HOW THE RATE OF REACTION CHANGES WITH VARYING CONCENTRATIONS OF THE REACTANTS. THE OVERALL ORDER OF THE REACTION IS THE SUM OF THE INDIVIDUAL ORDERS:

$$\text{OVERALL ORDER} = m + n$$

FOR EXAMPLE, IF A REACTION HAS A RATE EQUATION OF $\text{Rate} = k [A]^2 [B]^1$, IT IS A SECOND-ORDER REACTION WITH RESPECT TO A AND FIRST-ORDER WITH RESPECT TO B, MAKING THE OVERALL ORDER THREE.

FACTORS AFFECTING REACTION RATES

VARIOUS FACTORS CAN INFLUENCE THE RATE OF A CHEMICAL REACTION, WHICH CAN BE ANALYZED IN CONJUNCTION WITH RATE LAWS. THE PRIMARY FACTORS INCLUDE:

- **SURFACE AREA:** IN REACTIONS INVOLVING SOLIDS, INCREASING THE SURFACE AREA (E.G., BY GRINDING) CAN ENHANCE THE REACTION RATE BY PROVIDING MORE AREA FOR COLLISIONS.
- **CATALYSTS:** CATALYSTS ARE SUBSTANCES THAT INCREASE THE RATE OF A REACTION WITHOUT BEING CONSUMED, OFTEN BY LOWERING THE ACTIVATION ENERGY REQUIRED FOR THE REACTION TO PROCEED.

TYPES OF RATE LAWS

ELEMENTARY REACTIONS

ELEMENTARY REACTIONS ARE SINGLE-STEP REACTIONS THAT OCCUR IN A SINGLE COLLISION EVENT. THE RATE LAW FOR ELEMENTARY REACTIONS CAN BE DIRECTLY DETERMINED FROM THE STOICHIOMETRY OF THE REACTION. FOR INSTANCE, FOR THE REACTION $A + B \rightarrow \text{PRODUCTS}$, THE RATE LAW WOULD BE $\text{Rate} = k[A][B]$.

COMPLEX REACTIONS

Complex reactions involve multiple steps and may have rate laws that do not correspond directly to their stoichiometric equations. For these reactions, the overall rate is often determined by the slowest step, known as the rate-determining step. The rate law must be derived from experimental data rather than stoichiometric coefficients.

ZERO-ORDER REACTIONS

In zero-order reactions, the rate is constant and independent of the concentration of the reactants. This occurs when a reactant is in excess and does not affect the rate. The rate law is expressed as $\text{Rate} = k$, where k is the rate constant.

FIRST-ORDER REACTIONS

First-order reactions have a rate directly proportional to the concentration of one reactant. The rate law is given by $\text{Rate} = k[A]$. The half-life of a first-order reaction is constant and independent of the initial concentration.

SECOND-ORDER REACTIONS

Second-order reactions depend on the concentration of one reactant squared or on the concentrations of two different reactants. The rate law can be expressed as $\text{Rate} = k[A]^2$ or $\text{Rate} = k[A][B]$. The half-life for second-order reactions varies with the initial concentration.

APPLICATIONS OF RATE LAWS IN CHEMISTRY

A: THE OVERALL ORDER OF THIS REACTION IS 3, CALCULATED BY SUMMING THE INDIVIDUAL ORDERS: 2 (FOR A) + 1 (FOR B) = 3.

Q: IN WHAT FIELDS ARE RATE LAWS PARTICULARLY IMPORTANT?
