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INTRODUCTION TO SPECTROSCOPY

TYPES OF SPECTROSCOPY

INFRARED SPECTROSCOPY (IR)

INFRARED SPECTROSCOPY IS A TECHNIQUE THAT FOCUSES ON THE INFRARED REGION OF THE ELECTROMAGNETIC SPECTRUM. IT IS PARTICULARLY USEFUL FOR IDENTIFYING FUNCTIONAL GROUPS IN ORGANIC COMPOUNDS. NUCLEAR MAGNETIC RESONANCE SPECTROSCOPY (NMR)

NMR SPECTROSCOPY IS ANOTHER PIVOTAL TECHNIQUE IN CHEMISTRY, PRIMARILY USED FOR DETERMINING THE STRUCTURE OF ORGANIC COMPOUNDS. IT RELIES ON THE MAGNETIC PROPERTIES OF CERTAIN NUCLEI, SUCH AS HYDROGEN OR CARBON-13. ULTRAVIOLET-VISIBLE SPECTROSCOPY (UV-VIS)

UV-VIS SPECTROSCOPY MEASURES THE ABSORPTION OF ULTRAVIOLET AND VISIBLE LIGHT BY A SUBSTANCE. THIS TECHNIQUE IS WIDELY USED IN QUANTITATIVE ANALYSIS, ESPECIALLY FOR COLORED SOLUTIONS. BY APPLYING THE BEER-LAMBERT LAW, CHEMISTS CAN RELATE THE ABSORBANCE OF LIGHT TO THE CONCENTRATION OF THE ABSORBING SPECIES IN SOLUTION. THIS MAKES UV-VIS SPECTROSCOPY A CRUCIAL METHOD IN FIELDS SUCH AS BIOCHEMISTRY AND ENVIRONMENTAL MONITORING.

PRINCIPLES OF SPECTROSCOPY

THE RESULTING SPECTRUM DISPLAYS PEAKS AT THESE WAVELENGTHS, WHICH CAN BE ANALYZED TO PROVIDE INFORMATION ABOUT THE MOLECULAR STRUCTURE.

IN EMISSION SPECTROSCOPY, A SAMPLE EMITS LIGHT AFTER BEING ENERGIZED, TYPICALLY BY HEAT OR ELECTROMAGNETIC RADIATION. THE EMITTED LIGHT IS ANALYZED TO DETERMINE THE WAVELENGTHS, WHICH CAN INDICATE THE ELEMENTAL COMPOSITION AND ELECTRONIC STRUCTURE OF THE SAMPLE.

APPLICATIONS OF SPECTROSCOPY IN CHEMISTRY
