MOLECULAR GEOMETRY OVERVIEW

THE PLANAR STRUCTURE OF ETHYLENE IS CRUCIAL FOR ITS REACTIVITY IN VARIOUS CHEMICAL REACTIONS, INCLUDING POLYMERIZATION AND ADDITION REACTIONS.

PHOSPHATE ION (PO_4^{3-})

THE PHOSPHATE ION IS ANOTHER EXAMPLE WHERE TRIGONAL PLANAR GEOMETRY PLAYS A SIGNIFICANT ROLE. IN ITS CONJUGATED FORM, THE PHOSPHATE GROUP FEATURES A CENTRAL PHOSPHORUS ATOM SURROUNDED BY FOUR OXYGEN ATOMS.
