INTRODUCTION TO ORGANIC REACTIONS

TYPES OF ORGANIC REACTIONS

ADDITION REACTIONS

ADDITION REACTIONS OCCUR WHEN TWO OR MORE REACTANTS COMBINE TO FORM A SINGLE PRODUCT. THESE REACTIONS ARE PARTICULARLY SIGNIFICANT FOR ALKENES AND ALKYNES, WHICH CONTAIN DOUBLE OR TRIPLE BONDS THAT CAN BE BROKEN TO ALLOW FOR THE ADDITION OF NEW ATOMS OR GROUPS. THE GENERAL MECHANISM INVOLVES THE FORMATION OF A REACTIVE INTERMEDIATE, SUCH AS A CARBOCATION OR RADICAL, WHICH SUBSEQUENTLY LEADS TO THE FORMATION OF THE FINAL PRODUCT.

COMMON EXAMPLES OF ADDITION REACTIONS INCLUDE:

- HYDROGENATION: THE ADDITION OF HYDROGEN ACROSS A DOUBLE BOND, CONVERTING ALKENES INTO ALKANES.

ELIMINATION REACTIONS

ELIMINATION REACTIONS INVOLVE THE REMOVAL OF A SMALL MOLECULE FROM A LARGER ONE, RESULTING IN THE FORMATION OF A DOUBLE BOND OR A RING STRUCTURE. THESE REACTIONS ARE THE REVERSE OF ADDITION REACTIONS AND ARE CRUCIAL FOR THE SYNTHESIS OF ALKENES FROM ALCOHOLS OR ALKYL HALIDES. THE MECHANISM TYPICALLY INVOLVES THE FORMATION OF A LEAVING GROUP AND THE GENERATION OF A DOUBLE BOND.

KEY TYPES OF ELIMINATION REACTIONS INCLUDE:

- E1 MECHANISM: A TWO-STEP PROCESS INVOLVING THE FORMATION OF A CARBOCATION INTERMEDIATE.
- E2 MECHANISM: A CONCERTED PROCESS WHERE THE ELIMINATION OCCURS IN A SINGLE STEP, REQUIRING A STRONG BASE.

SUBSTITUTION REACTIONS

SUBSTITUTION REACTIONS INVOLVE THE REPLACEMENT OF ONE ATOM OR GROUP IN A MOLECULE WITH ANOTHER ATOM OR GROUP. THESE REACTIONS ARE PARTICULARLY COMMON IN ALIPHATIC AND AROMATIC COMPOUNDS AND CAN BE CLASSIFIED AS NUCLEOPHILIC OR ELECTROPHILIC SUBSTITUTIONS DEPENDING ON THE NATURE OF THE ATTACKING SPECIES.

EXAMPLES OF SUBSTITUTION REACTIONS INCLUDE:

- NUCLEOPHILIC SUBSTITUTION ($\text{S}_\text{N}1$ AND $\text{S}_\text{N}2$): INVOLVES THE SUBSTITUTION OF A LEAVING GROUP BY A NUCLEOPHILE.
- ELECTROPHILIC AROMATIC SUBSTITUTION: A REACTION WHERE AN ELECTROPHILE REPLACES A HYDROGEN ATOM IN AN AROMATIC RING.

REARRANGEMENT REACTIONS

REARRANGEMENT REACTIONS INVOLVE THE STRUCTURAL REORGANIZATION OF A MOLECULE, RESULTING IN THE FORMATION OF AN ISOMER. THESE REACTIONS CAN OCCUR THROUGH VARIOUS MECHANISMS AND OFTEN INVOLVE THE MIGRATION OF ATOMS OR GROUPS WITHIN THE MOLECULE, LEADING TO CHANGES IN CONNECTIVITY.

COMMON REARRANGEMENTS INCLUDE:

- **HYDRIDE SHIFTS:** THE MIGRATION OF A HYDROGEN ATOM TO A NEIGHBORING CARBON.
- **CARBOCATION REARRANGEMENTS:** OCCUR TO STABILIZE A CARBOCATION BY SHIFTING THE POSITION OF SUBSTITUENTS.

FACTORS INFLUENCING ORGANIC REACTIONS
