OCCURRENCE OF TIN IN NATURE

- **ELECTRONICS:** IN THE ELECTRONICS INDUSTRY, TIN IS USED IN SOLDERING COMPONENTS AND CIRCUIT BOARDS DUE TO ITS EXCELLENT CONDUCTIVITY AND NON-TOXIC PROPERTIES.
- **GLASS PRODUCTION:** TIN COMPOUNDS ARE UTILIZED IN THE MANUFACTURING OF GLASS, PARTICULARLY IN THE PRODUCTION OF TIN OXIDE, WHICH IS USED IN GLASS COATINGS AND AS A POLISHING AGENT.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT OF TIN
