TYPES OF EXTERNALITIES

THE ESSENCE OF THE COASE THEOREM

- **WELL-DEFINED PROPERTY RIGHTS:** THE PARTIES INVOLVED MUST HAVE CLEAR OWNERSHIP OF THE RESOURCES IN QUESTION.
- **LOW TRANSACTION COSTS:** THE COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH NEGOTIATING AND ENFORCING AGREEMENTS MUST BE MINIMAL.
- **RATIONAL ACTORS:** INDIVIDUALS ARE ASSUMED TO ACT RATIONALLY, SEEKING TO MAXIMIZE THEIR UTILITY THROUGH NEGOTIATION.

THESE ASSUMPTIONS HIGHLIGHT THE IDEAL CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH THE COASE THEOREM OPERATES, BUT THEY ALSO UNDERScore THE COMPLEXITY OF REAL-WORLD APPLICATIONS WHERE SUCH CONDITIONS MAY NOT ALWAYS BE MET.

IMPLICATIONS OF THE COASE THEOREM
