UNDERSTANDING GROUP ECONOMICS

CORE TENETS OF SOCIALISM

KEY TENETS OF SOCIALISM INCLUDE:

- **COLLECTIVE OWNERSHIP:** THE MEANS OF PRODUCTION ARE OWNED COLLECTIVELY OR BY THE STATE.
- **ECONOMIC PLANNING:** CENTRALIZED PLANNING IS OFTEN USED TO ALLOCATE RESOURCES AND PRODUCTION.
- **WEALTH REDISTRIBUTION:** POLICIES ARE IMPLEMENTED TO REDISTRIBUTE WEALTH TO ACHIEVE ECONOMIC EQUALITY.

KEY DIFFERENCES BETWEEN GROUP ECONOMICS AND SOCIALISM
