UNDERSTANDING MACROECONOMICS

KEY MACROECONOMIC INDICATORS

INFLATION RATE

UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

THE UNEMPLOYMENT RATE IS A MEASURE OF THE NUMBER OF UNEMPLOYED PEOPLE AS A PERCENTAGE OF THE LABOR FORCE. IT SERVES AS AN INDICATOR OF ECONOMIC HEALTH, REFLECTING THE AVAILABILITY OF JOBS AND THE ECONOMIC ACTIVITY LEVEL. HIGH UNEMPLOYMENT CAN SIGNAL ECONOMIC DISTRESS, WHILE LOW UNEMPLOYMENT INDICATES A THRIVING ECONOMY.

TRADE BALANCE

THE TRADE BALANCE IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN A COUNTRY'S EXPORTS AND IMPORTS. A POSITIVE TRADE BALANCE (SURPLUS) OCCURS WHEN EXPORTS EXCEED IMPORTS, WHILE A NEGATIVE BALANCE (DEFICIT) OCCURS WHEN IMPORTS EXCEED EXPORTS. THE TRADE BALANCE AFFECTS CURRENCY STRENGTH AND OVERALL ECONOMIC STABILITY.

ECONOMIC THEORIES AND MODELS

KEYNESIAN ECONOMICS, DEVELOPED BY JOHN MAYNARD KEYNES DURING THE GREAT DEPRESSION, ARGUES THAT AGGREGATE DEMAND IS THE PRIMARY DRIVING FORCE IN AN ECONOMY. KEYNESIANS ADVOCATE FOR GOVERNMENT INTERVENTION, ESPECIALLY DURING ECONOMIC DOWNTURNS, TO STIMULATE DEMAND AND PROMOTE ECONOMIC RECOVERY. THIS APPROACH HAS SIGNIFICANTLY INFLUENCED MODERN MACROECONOMIC POLICY.

MONETARISM

MONETARISM, CHAMPIONED BY MILTON FRIEDMAN, EMPHASIZES THE ROLE OF GOVERNMENT IN CONTROLLING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY IN CIRCULATION.
