

WHY IS ECONOMICS NOT JUST ALL ABOUT MONEY

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UNDERSTANDING THE SCOPE OF ECONOMICS

AT ITS CORE, ECONOMICS IS ABOUT UNDERSTANDING THE TRADE-OFFS INVOLVED IN DECISION-MAKING PROCESSES.

THE DEFINITION OF ECONOMICS

ECONOMICS CAN BE DEFINED AS THE STUDY OF HOW SOCIETIES ALLOCATE SCARCE RESOURCES TO SATISFY UNLIMITED WANTS. THE ROLE OF SCARCITY AND CHOICE
