- **IGNORING FORMATTING GUIDELINES:** ADHERE TO ANY SPECIFIC FORMATTING REQUIREMENTS PROVIDED BY YOUR INSTRUCTOR OR INSTITUTION.
- **FAILING TO CITE SOURCES:** ALWAYS GIVE CREDIT TO THE ORIGINAL AUTHORS OF ANY THEORIES, METHODS, OR DATA YOU REFERENCE.
