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WHAT IS REACTOR PHYSICS?

MANY UNIVERSITIES OFFER DEDICATED PROGRAMS IN NUCLEAR ENGINEERING WITH SPECIALIZATIONS IN REACTOR PHYSICS.

ESSENTIAL TECHNICAL SKILLS

A STRONG GRASP OF FUNDAMENTAL PHYSICS AND MATHEMATICS IS NON-NEGOTIABLE. THIS INCLUDES:

COMMUNICATION SKILLS: REACTOR PHYSICISTS MUST EFFECTIVELY COMMUNICATE COMPLEX TECHNICAL INFORMATION TO DIVERSE AUDIENCES, INCLUDING ENGINEERS, OPERATORS, MANAGERS, AND REGULATORY BODIES. THIS INCLUDES STRONG WRITTEN AND VERBAL COMMUNICATION.

TEAMWORK: COLLABORATION WITH OTHER ENGINEERS, SCIENTISTS, AND TECHNICIANS IS A DAILY ASPECT OF THE JOB.

ADAPTABILITY: THE NUCLEAR FIELD IS CONSTANTLY EVOLVING, SO A WILLINGNESS TO LEARN AND ADAPT TO NEW TECHNOLOGIES AND METHODOLOGIES IS KEY.

WORK ENVIRONMENTS FOR REACTOR PHYSICS PROFESSIONALS

THE PROFESSIONAL LANDSCAPE FOR REACTOR PHYSICS JOBS IS DIVERSE, SPANNING ACROSS VARIOUS SECTORS AND OFFERING DISTINCT WORK ENVIRONMENTS. HERE, THE WORK ENVIRONMENT IS DYNAMIC AND HIGHLY REGULATED, WITH A CONSTANT FOCUS ON SAFETY AND EFFICIENCY. REACTOR PHYSICISTS ON-SITE AT POWER PLANTS ARE DEEPLY INVOLVED IN SUPPORTING DAILY OPERATIONS, CONDUCTING PERFORMANCE MONITORING, AND PERFORMING SAFETY ANALYSES FOR OPERATIONAL CHANGES. THE ATMOSPHERE CAN BE INTENSE, ESPECIALLY DURING REFUELING OUTAGES OR WHEN ADDRESSING OPERATIONAL CHALLENGES. THERE'S A TANGIBLE SENSE OF RESPONSIBILITY KNOWING THAT YOUR CALCULATIONS DIRECTLY IMPACT THE SAFE GENERATION OF ELECTRICITY FOR THOUSANDS, IF NOT MILLIONS, OF PEOPLE.

RESEARCH LABORATORIES AND NATIONAL LABS

FOR THOSE WITH A STRONG INCLINATION TOWARDS THEORETICAL EXPLORATION AND CUTTING-EDGE DEVELOPMENT, RESEARCH LABORATORIES AND NATIONAL LABORATORIES OFFER A STIMULATING ENVIRONMENT. THESE INSTITUTIONS, OFTEN FUNDED BY GOVERNMENT AGENCIES OR ACADEMIC BODIES, ARE HUBS FOR INNOVATION. REACTOR PHYSICISTS HERE MIGHT BE ENGAGED IN DEVELOPING NEW REACTOR DESIGNS, EXPLORING ADVANCED FUEL CONCEPTS, REFINING COMPUTATIONAL SIMULATION TOOLS, OR CONDUCTING FUNDAMENTAL RESEARCH IN NUCLEAR SCIENCE. THE ENVIRONMENT IS TYPICALLY MORE ACADEMIC AND RESEARCH-ORIENTED, WITH OPPORTUNITIES FOR COLLABORATION ON LARGE-SCALE PROJECTS AND PUBLICATION OF FINDINGS.

NUCLEAR INDUSTRY VENDORS AND CONSULTANTS

COMPANIES THAT DESIGN, MANUFACTURE, OR SERVICE NUCLEAR COMPONENTS AND SYSTEMS, AS WELL AS CONSULTING FIRMS SPECIALIZING IN NUCLEAR ENGINEERING, ALSO EMPLOY A SUBSTANTIAL NUMBER OF REACTOR PHYSICISTS. IN THESE SETTINGS, PROFESSIONALS MIGHT WORK ON THE DESIGN OF NEW REACTORS, PROVIDE SPECIALIZED EXPERTISE FOR EXISTING PLANTS, OR ASSIST IN REGULATORY COMPLIANCE. THE WORK CAN BE PROJECT-BASED, INVOLVING TRAVEL TO DIFFERENT SITES AND INTERACTING WITH A VARIETY OF CLIENTS. THIS ENVIRONMENT OFTEN REQUIRES A BROAD UNDERSTANDING OF DIFFERENT REACTOR TECHNOLOGIES AND A STRONG ABILITY TO ADAPT TO DIVERSE PROJECT NEEDS.

GOVERNMENT REGULATORY AGENCIES

AGENCIES RESPONSIBLE FOR THE OVERSIGHT AND REGULATION OF NUCLEAR POWER, SUCH AS THE NUCLEAR REGULATORY COMMISSION (NRC) IN THE UNITED STATES, EMPLOY REACTOR PHYSICISTS TO REVIEW SAFETY ANALYSES, DEVELOP

ACADEMIC RESEARCHERS CONTRIBUTE TO THE ADVANCEMENT OF KNOWLEDGE, DEVELOP NEW PEDAGOGICAL APPROACHES, AND OFTEN COLLABORATE WITH INDUSTRY AND GOVERNMENT ON SIGNIFICANT RESEARCH PROJECTS.

THE REACTOR PHYSICS JOB MARKET OUTLOOK

THE JOB MARKET FOR REACTOR PHYSICISTS IS PROJECTED TO REMAIN STRONG AND STABLE, FUELED BY SEVERAL KEY DRIVERS WITHIN THE GLOBAL ENERGY LANDSCAPE. WHILE THE NUCLEAR INDUSTRY HAS FACED ITS SHARE OF PUBLIC PERCEPTION CHALLENGES, THE FUNDAMENTAL NEED FOR RELIABLE, LOW-CARBON ENERGY SOURCES CONTINUES TO UNDERPIN DEMAND FOR SKILLED PROFESSIONALS IN THIS FIELD. THE INTRICATE NATURE OF NUCLEAR TECHNOLOGY AND THE STRINGENT SAFETY REQUIREMENTS ENSURE A CONSISTENT NEED FOR HIGHLY SPECIALIZED EXPERTISE.

ONE OF THE PRIMARY DRIVERS FOR SUSTAINED DEMAND IS THE ONGOING OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF EXISTING NUCLEAR POWER FLEETS WORLDWIDE. MANY OF THESE REACTORS ARE DESIGNED FOR LONG OPERATIONAL LIVES, REQUIRING CONTINUOUS INPUT FROM REACTOR PHYSICISTS TO ENSURE THEIR SAFE AND EFFICIENT PERFORMANCE. FURTHERMORE, SEVERAL COUNTRIES ARE ACTIVELY PURSUING NEW NUCLEAR POWER PROJECTS, INCLUDING ADVANCED REACTOR DESIGNS, WHICH WILL NECESSITATE THE DESIGN, LICENSING, AND OPERATION OF NEW FACILITIES. THIS EXPANSION, ALBEIT SOMETIMES GRADUAL, CREATES NEW JOB OPPORTUNITIES.

THE INCREASING GLOBAL FOCUS ON CLIMATE CHANGE AND THE NEED TO TRANSITION AWAY FROM FOSSIL FUELS ARE ALSO BOLSTERING THE PROSPECTS FOR NUCLEAR ENERGY AND, CONSEQUENTLY, FOR REACTOR PHYSICS JOBS. NUCLEAR POWER IS RECOGNIZED AS A SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTOR TO LOW-CARBON ELECTRICITY GENERATION, AND AS NATIONS STRIVE TO MEET AMBITIOUS EMISSIONS REDUCTION TARGETS, THE ROLE OF NUCLEAR ENERGY IS LIKELY TO BE RE-EVALUATED AND POTENTIALLY EXPANDED. THIS RESURGENCE OF INTEREST IN NUCLEAR POWER DIRECTLY TRANSLATES INTO INCREASED DEMAND FOR THE HIGHLY SKILLED INDIVIDUALS WHO CAN MANAGE ITS COMPLEXITIES.

MOREOVER, THE DECOMMISSIONING OF OLDER NUCLEAR FACILITIES PRESENTS ANOTHER AREA OF GROWTH FOR REACTOR PHYSICISTS. SAFELY DISMANTLING AND MANAGING RETIRED NUCLEAR INFRASTRUCTURE REQUIRES EXTENSIVE PLANNING AND ANALYSIS, INCLUDING DETAILED CHARACTERIZATION OF RADIOACTIVE MATERIALS AND THE PHYSICS OF THEIR DECAY. THIS SPECIALIZED AREA DEMANDS A DEEP UNDERSTANDING OF REACTOR PHYSICS PRINCIPLES APPLIED IN A UNIQUE CONTEXT.

WHILE THE DEMAND IS ROBUST, IT'S ALSO HIGHLY SPECIALIZED. THE MARKET FAVORS INDIVIDUALS WITH ADVANCED DEGREES AND DEMONSTRATED EXPERTISE IN AREAS SUCH AS NEUTRONICS, CORE SIMULATION, FUEL MANAGEMENT, AND NUCLEAR SAFETY ANALYSIS. CONTINUOUS LEARNING AND ADAPTATION TO NEW TECHNOLOGIES, SUCH AS SMALL MODULAR REACTORS (SMRs) AND ADVANCED FUEL CYCLES, WILL BE CRUCIAL FOR CAREER LONGEVITY AND FOR CAPITALIZING ON EMERGING OPPORTUNITIES WITHIN THE REACTOR PHYSICS JOB MARKET.

CAREER PROGRESSION IN REACTOR PHYSICS

THE CAREER TRAJECTORY FOR A REACTOR PHYSICIST IS OFTEN CHARACTERIZED BY INCREASING RESPONSIBILITY, SPECIALIZATION, AND LEADERSHIP. STARTING FROM ENTRY-LEVEL POSITIONS, INDIVIDUALS CAN PROGRESS THROUGH A SERIES OF ROLES THAT BUILD UPON THEIR FOUNDATIONAL KNOWLEDGE AND PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE. THIS PROGRESSION IS TYPICALLY DRIVEN BY A COMBINATION OF DEMONSTRATED COMPETENCE, CONTINUED PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT, AND THE PURSUIT OF ADVANCED EXPERTISE.

ENTRY-LEVEL POSITIONS

UPON COMPLETING THEIR EDUCATION, INDIVIDUALS OFTEN BEGIN THEIR CAREERS IN ROLES SUCH AS JUNIOR REACTOR PHYSICIST, REACTOR ANALYST, OR NUCLEAR ENGINEER. IN THESE POSITIONS, THEY WORK UNDER THE GUIDANCE OF SENIOR STAFF, FOCUSING ON SPECIFIC TASKS LIKE RUNNING SIMULATION CODES, ANALYZING DATA, OR PERFORMING ROUTINE CALCULATIONS. THIS HANDS-

ON EXPERIENCE IS INVALUABLE FOR UNDERSTANDING REAL-WORLD APPLICATIONS OF THEORETICAL PRINCIPLES AND FOR DEVELOPING PROFICIENCY WITH INDUSTRY-STANDARD TOOLS AND METHODOLOGIES.

MID-LEVEL ROLES

AS REACTOR PHYSICISTS GAIN EXPERIENCE AND DEMONSTRATE A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF REACTOR BEHAVIOR, THEY CAN ADVANCE TO MID-LEVEL POSITIONS SUCH AS REACTOR PHYSICIST, SENIOR REACTOR ANALYST, OR FUEL MANAGEMENT ENGINEER. IN THESE ROLES, THEY ARE ENTRUSTED WITH MORE COMPLEX ANALYSES, MAY LEAD SMALLER PROJECTS, AND BEGIN TO MENTOR JUNIOR STAFF. THEY ARE OFTEN RESPONSIBLE FOR MORE CRITICAL ASPECTS OF REACTOR DESIGN, OPERATIONAL SUPPORT, OR SAFETY ANALYSIS, REQUIRING A GREATER DEGREE OF INDEPENDENT JUDGMENT AND PROBLEM-SOLVING.

SENIOR AND LEAD POSITIONS

FURTHER PROGRESSION LEADS TO SENIOR AND LEAD POSITIONS, INCLUDING LEAD REACTOR PHYSICIST, PRINCIPAL NUCLEAR ENGINEER, OR TECHNICAL MANAGER. AT THIS STAGE, PROFESSIONALS ARE RECOGNIZED EXPERTS IN THEIR FIELD, OFTEN LEADING LARGE TEAMS, OVERSEEING MAJOR PROJECTS, AND MAKING CRITICAL TECHNICAL DECISIONS. THEY MAY BE RESPONSIBLE FOR DEVELOPING NEW METHODOLOGIES, SETTING TECHNICAL STANDARDS, OR MANAGING THE OVERALL PHYSICS ASPECTS OF REACTOR DESIGN OR OPERATION. THEIR INPUT IS VITAL FOR STRATEGIC PLANNING AND FOR ENSURING THE LONG-TERM SUCCESS AND SAFETY OF NUCLEAR OPERATIONS.

MANAGEMENT AND EXECUTIVE ROLES

FOR SOME, CAREER PROGRESSION EXTENDS INTO MANAGEMENT AND EXECUTIVE LEADERSHIP. THIS COULD INVOLVE BECOMING A DIRECTOR OF NUCLEAR ENGINEERING, A PLANT MANAGER, OR EVEN TAKING ON EXECUTIVE ROLES WITHIN RESEARCH INSTITUTIONS OR GOVERNMENT AGENCIES. THESE POSITIONS REQUIRE A BLEND OF DEEP TECHNICAL UNDERSTANDING AND STRONG LEADERSHIP, MANAGEMENT, AND STRATEGIC PLANNING SKILLS. THE FOCUS SHIFTS FROM DAY-TO-DAY TECHNICAL EXECUTION TO BROADER ORGANIZATIONAL OVERSIGHT AND STRATEGIC DIRECTION.

THROUGHOUT THIS PROGRESSION, CONTINUOUS LEARNING IS ESSENTIAL. THIS INCLUDES STAYING ABREAST OF THE LATEST ADVANCEMENTS IN REACTOR TECHNOLOGY, COMPUTATIONAL METHODS, AND REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS. PURSUING PROFESSIONAL CERTIFICATIONS, ATTENDING CONFERENCES, AND ENGAGING IN ONGOING TRAINING ARE KEY COMPONENTS OF A SUCCESSFUL AND EVOLVING CAREER IN REACTOR PHYSICS.

CHALLENGES AND REWARDS OF A REACTOR PHYSICS CAREER

A CAREER IN REACTOR PHYSICS, WHILE INTELLECTUALLY STIMULATING AND VITAL FOR GLOBAL ENERGY NEEDS, COMES WITH ITS UNIQUE SET OF CHALLENGES AND PROFOUND REWARDS. NAVIGATING THIS SPECIALIZED FIELD REQUIRES A SPECIFIC MINDSET AND A COMMITMENT TO EXCELLENCE, WHICH IN TURN, CAN LEAD TO A DEEPLY SATISFYING PROFESSIONAL JOURNEY.

CHALLENGES

ONE OF THE FOREMOST CHALLENGES IS THE SHEER INTELLECTUAL RIGOR DEMANDED BY THE FIELD. REACTOR PHYSICS INVOLVES COMPLEX MATHEMATICAL MODELING, INTRICATE COMPUTATIONAL ANALYSIS, AND A DEEP UNDERSTANDING OF NUCLEAR PHENOMENA. THE CONSTANT NEED TO PROCESS VAST AMOUNTS OF DATA AND PERFORM HIGHLY PRECISE CALCULATIONS CAN BE DEMANDING.

ANOTHER SIGNIFICANT CHALLENGE IS THE IMMENSE RESPONSIBILITY THAT COMES WITH THE JOB. THE SAFETY OF NUCLEAR OPERATIONS, THE PROTECTION OF THE PUBLIC, AND ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP ARE ALL DIRECTLY INFLUENCED BY THE WORK OF REACTOR PHYSICISTS. THIS CAN CREATE A HIGH-PRESSURE ENVIRONMENT WHERE ACCURACY AND DILIGENCE ARE PARAMOUNT, AND THE CONSEQUENCES OF ERRORS, HOWEVER RARE, CAN BE SEVERE.

THE PACE OF TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANCEMENT CAN ALSO PRESENT A CHALLENGE. THE FIELD IS CONSTANTLY EVOLVING WITH NEW REACTOR DESIGNS, ADVANCED COMPUTATIONAL TOOLS, AND EMERGING RESEARCH. REACTOR PHYSICISTS MUST COMMIT TO CONTINUOUS LEARNING TO STAY CURRENT AND MAINTAIN THEIR EXPERTISE, WHICH REQUIRES SIGNIFICANT DEDICATION BEYOND FORMAL EDUCATION.

FURTHERMORE, PUBLIC PERCEPTION OF NUCLEAR ENERGY CAN SOMETIMES CREATE AN ENVIRONMENT OF SCRUTINY. WHILE THE SCIENTIFIC AND ENGINEERING PRINCIPLES OF SAFE REACTOR OPERATION ARE WELL-ESTABLISHED, THE INDUSTRY OFTEN FACES PUBLIC CONCERNS THAT REQUIRE CLEAR AND EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION FROM ITS PROFESSIONALS.

REWARDS

DESPITE THESE CHALLENGES, THE REWARDS OF A REACTOR PHYSICS CAREER ARE SUBSTANTIAL AND DEEPLY FULFILLING. PERHAPS THE MOST SIGNIFICANT REWARD IS THE OPPORTUNITY TO CONTRIBUTE TO A CRITICAL ASPECT OF GLOBAL ENERGY PRODUCTION. REACTOR PHYSICISTS ARE AT THE FOREFRONT OF PROVIDING CLEAN, RELIABLE, AND LOW-CARBON ELECTRICITY, PLAYING A VITAL ROLE IN COMBATING CLIMATE CHANGE AND ENSURING ENERGY SECURITY FOR NATIONS.

THE INTELLECTUAL STIMULATION DERIVED FROM SOLVING COMPLEX SCIENTIFIC AND ENGINEERING PROBLEMS IS ANOTHER MAJOR DRAW. REACTOR PHYSICISTS ARE ENGAGED IN CUTTING-EDGE RESEARCH AND ANALYSIS, CONSTANTLY PUSHING THE BOUNDARIES OF KNOWLEDGE IN NUCLEAR SCIENCE. THE ABILITY TO UNDERSTAND AND CONTROL THE FUNDAMENTAL FORCES OF THE ATOM FOR BENEFICIAL PURPOSES IS A SOURCE OF GREAT PROFESSIONAL PRIDE.

THE JOB SECURITY AND COMPETITIVE COMPENSATION WITHIN THE REACTOR PHYSICS FIELD ARE ALSO SIGNIFICANT ADVANTAGES. DUE TO THE SPECIALIZED NATURE OF THE WORK AND THE ONGOING DEMAND, PROFESSIONALS IN THIS DISCIPLINE OFTEN ENJOY STABLE EMPLOYMENT AND ATTRACTIVE SALARY PACKAGES.

FINALLY, THE OPPORTUNITY TO WORK IN A HIGHLY COLLABORATIVE AND MULTIDISCIPLINARY ENVIRONMENT, ALONGSIDE SOME OF THE BRIGHTEST MINDS IN SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING, CAN BE INCREDIBLY REWARDING. THE SHARED COMMITMENT TO SAFETY AND INNOVATION FOSTERS A STRONG SENSE OF CAMARADERIE AND PURPOSE. THE IMPACT OF ONE'S WORK ON A GLOBAL SCALE, CONTRIBUTING TO A CLEANER FUTURE AND DEPENDABLE ENERGY, MAKES THE DEDICATION AND EFFORT PROFOUNDLY WORTHWHILE.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT REACTOR PHYSICS JOBS

Q: WHAT IS THE TYPICAL STARTING SALARY FOR A REACTOR PHYSICIST?

A: STARTING SALARIES FOR REACTOR PHYSICISTS CAN VARY SIGNIFICANTLY BASED ON FACTORS SUCH AS EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT (MASTER'S VS. PH.D.), LOCATION, EMPLOYER (E.G., GOVERNMENT LAB, UTILITY, PRIVATE COMPANY), AND SPECIFIC ROLE. HOWEVER, ENTRY-LEVEL POSITIONS GENERALLY OFFER COMPETITIVE SALARIES, OFTEN IN THE RANGE OF \$70,000 TO \$100,000 PER YEAR IN MANY DEVELOPED COUNTRIES. WITH EXPERIENCE AND ADVANCED DEGREES, THESE FIGURES CAN INCREASE SUBSTANTIALLY.

Q: DO I NEED A PH.D. TO GET A JOB IN REACTOR PHYSICS?

A: WHILE A PH.D. IS OFTEN PREFERRED FOR RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT ROLES, OR FOR POSITIONS REQUIRING DEEP THEORETICAL EXPERTISE, IT IS NOT ALWAYS A MANDATORY REQUIREMENT FOR ALL REACTOR PHYSICS JOBS. MANY POSITIONS, ESPECIALLY IN OPERATIONAL SUPPORT, FUEL MANAGEMENT, OR CERTAIN ANALYSIS ROLES WITHIN NUCLEAR POWER PLANTS OR INDUSTRY VENDORS, CAN BE ACCESSIBLE WITH A MASTER'S DEGREE IN NUCLEAR ENGINEERING OR A RELATED FIELD. HOWEVER, A PH.D. CAN CERTAINLY PROVIDE A COMPETITIVE EDGE AND OPEN DOORS TO MORE ADVANCED RESEARCH-ORIENTED CAREERS.

Q: WHAT ARE THE MOST COMMON COMPUTATIONAL TOOLS USED BY REACTOR PHYSICISTS?

A: REACTOR PHYSICISTS EXTENSIVELY USE A VARIETY OF SOPHISTICATED COMPUTATIONAL TOOLS. AMONG THE MOST COMMON ARE MONTE CARLO CODES SUCH AS MCNP (MONTE CARLO N-PARTICLE TRANSPORT CODE) AND SERPENT, WHICH ARE USED FOR DETAILED NEUTRON TRANSPORT SIMULATIONS. DETERMINISTIC CODES LIKE PARCS AND CASMO ARE ALSO WIDELY EMPLOYED FOR REACTOR CORE ANALYSIS AND FUEL ASSEMBLY CALCULATIONS. PROFICIENCY IN USING AND UNDERSTANDING THESE CODES IS A CRUCIAL SKILL FOR MOST REACTOR PHYSICS ROLES.

Q: HOW IMPORTANT IS KNOWLEDGE OF NUCLEAR SAFETY REGULATIONS FOR REACTOR PHYSICS JOBS?

A: KNOWLEDGE OF NUCLEAR SAFETY REGULATIONS IS ABSOLUTELY PARAMOUNT FOR ALMOST ALL REACTOR PHYSICS JOBS, PARTICULARLY THOSE IN THE NUCLEAR POWER INDUSTRY AND REGULATORY AGENCIES. REACTOR PHYSICISTS ARE DIRECTLY INVOLVED IN SAFETY ANALYSES, ACCIDENT SIMULATIONS, AND ENSURING COMPLIANCE WITH STRINGENT NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL SAFETY STANDARDS. A THOROUGH UNDERSTANDING OF REGULATORY FRAMEWORKS, SUCH AS THOSE SET BY THE NRC (NUCLEAR REGULATORY COMMISSION) IN THE U.S. OR SIMILAR BODIES GLOBALLY, IS ESSENTIAL FOR PERFORMING THEIR DUTIES EFFECTIVELY AND LEGALLY.

Q: WHAT ARE THE FUTURE TRENDS IMPACTING REACTOR PHYSICS JOBS?

A: FUTURE TRENDS INFLUENCING REACTOR PHYSICS JOBS INCLUDE THE DEVELOPMENT AND DEPLOYMENT OF ADVANCED REACTOR

DESIGNS LIKE SMALL MODULAR REACTORS (SMRs) AND GENERATION IV REACTORS. THERE IS ALSO A GROWING FOCUS ON THE PHYSICS OF NUCLEAR FUSION RESEARCH, ADVANCED FUEL CYCLES, AND ENHANCED SAFETY SYSTEMS. FURTHERMORE, THE INCREASING EMPHASIS ON NUCLEAR DECOMMISSIONING WILL CREATE MORE SPECIALIZED ROLES. THE ONGOING NEED FOR LOW-CARBON ENERGY SOURCES AND THE POTENTIAL RE-EVALUATION OF NUCLEAR ENERGY'S ROLE IN COMBATING CLIMATE CHANGE SUGGEST A CONTINUED DEMAND FOR SKILLED REACTOR PHYSICISTS.

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
